#### Computer awareness-

The teaching, non teaching staff and students are made aware of computer. Computer with the internet is the most powerful device for the student to learn new skills. The teachers were encouraged to engage classes in smart classrooms thus using the audio visual aid. The lectures were more interesting for the students. The retention of knowledge was far better. Many members of the faculty were engaged in giving lectures in virtual classes thus benefiting not only the students of college but also all colleges of Madhya Pradesh. The career and placement cell conducted training on computer thus facilitating the students to be better equipped in computer skills. The department of Hindi and English conducted Online CCE at UG/PG Level. Many departments created online question bank for the students. The department of English created blogs and whatsapp groups for using Internet for better updation of knowledge. The lectures delivered by the faculty in virtual classes are uploaded on Youtube for the benefit of students. The computer awareness has become a common source of exchanging thought and information. Teachers encourage assignment submission through emails. Computer knowledge provides internet research proficiency so that the students can be more efficient.

Research Orientation- Research helps students in better understanding. Govt. Hamidia College is the research center for 13 subjects. There are 28 research guides in the college with 38 students registered in the present session. In this session, 19 Pre-Phd submission presentations were given. The post graduate students are encouraged to be more research oriented by attending pre PhD submission presentations in the campus. The students not only attend the presentation but also critically question the candidates thus learning the art of critical evaluation. The presentations are made on PowerPoint followed by healthy discussion and suggestions for the thesis. This participation of students has helped them for better understanding of the subject and also widening the vision. It has helped to develop their individual point of view.
