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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The alumni who have made a distinct mark in national and international spheres significantly contribute to their alma mater in myriad ways.
- The institute has taken some trail blazing outreach initiatives. The college excels in altruism, extension activities and nation building endeavors.
- The college has experienced, highly qualified, assiduous and dedicated faculty members. Most of them have Ph.D. and are Research guides. They are members in Board of Studies of Barkatullah University and other universities. More than 50% teaching faculty is resource person and subject expert at state and national level.
- Responsive, effective and efficient administration is also one of the greatest strengths of the institute.
- The N.S.S. unit of our institute has won a number of accolades and awards. The accomplishments and achievements of N.S.S. are outstanding.
- The institute has a lush green campus endowed with rich flora and fauna. RUSA fund of Rs. 2 crores has been utilized for new construction, renovation and supporting infrastructure.
- Participation of students in the decision making process is ensured. They are made members in various

Institutional Weakness

- Approach road is narrow as the building is situated in a densely populated locality. One of the problems often faced by the students and faculty members is the traffic jam due to narrow approach road at the entrance.
- The students from all parts of the state come to this college to pursue their aspirations. Accommodation (Hostel) facility is not available for them.
- Transportation facility is inadequate.
- Information Technology resources are not sufficient.
- The college does not have adequate number of MOUs. The institute has been working in this direction.
- Paucity of funds sometimes hinders taking up of research activities and green initiatives.

Institutional Opportunity

- The college has tremendous potential to become a Research Hub. The students can be oriented for Research. The college can be developed into a vibrant Research and Innovation Center.
- The college has immense scope for promoting skill development and self employment. The college can become an Enabling Hub and can empower youth.
- The college has the potential to be a center for augmenting innovation and creativity. The Drawing and Painting Department has made a distinct mark in academic and co-curricular activities.
- The college can become center for Yoga and Sports training The students have made significant achievements in national and international sports events.
- The students of our college have made great contribution in outreach activities. The NSS Unit of the college can be further strengthened.

Institutional Challenge

Students are coming from diverse backgrounds. Most of them are from less privileged class and rural areas. Bringing them into the mainstream is a major challenge.

One of the challenges we have is to ensure more placements of the students in reputed institutions.

Financially weak students remain dependent on government aid. Institutional support has to be increased by introducing more freeships.

Lack of good communication skills is a major hurdle in getting better placements for students.

Better performance of the students in competitive exams has to be ensured.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college offers B.A., B.Com. Plain, B.Com. (Honours), B.Com. Computer Application, B.B.A. and BCA at the undergraduate level, M.A. in 11 subjects as well as M.Com. The college is also a Research Center for Ph.D. As per the directives of the Department of Higher Education, M.P. Govt., Annual pattern of exam for U.G. level and Semester system for P.G. level is being followed. The various academic and co-curricular activities of the institute are conducted in accordance with the Academic Calendar issued by the Department of Higher Education, at the commencement of the academic session. The Academic Calendar comprises of Admission Schedule, Teaching, Examination and Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) details. The Academic Calendar also indicates the annual working days, co-curricular and Sports activities. It is displayed on the college Notice Board as well as College Website. A meticulous weekly planner is prepared by the faculty members and various teaching modes are applied for effective teaching learning. As the institute is affiliated to Barkatullah University, Bhopal the syllabus is framed and updated by the University.

Many faculty members from the institute are members in the Central Board of studies , Barkatullah University, Bhopal who present their views on the updation of syllabus, inclusion of relevant topics and other issues related to exams and evaluation. During the last five years, 04 Add on courses/certificate programmes have been introduced by the institute.

There are contents in the syllabus being followed by the college which inculcate awareness regarding gender, human values and environment. These topics are covered in syllabi of U.G. and P.G. Classes. Project work/internship is an integral part of the syllabus of final year classes. Workshops, Lectures, Seminars, Webinars and other activities like collage making, slogan writing, group activities to inculcate awareness regarding the issues of gender sensitivity, environment and human values are regularly held. Feedback from students, teachers, employers and alumni is obtained on a regular basis and is analyzed with the aim to provide a gratifying learning experience to the students. The process of Continuous Internal Assessment is transparent, systematic, comprehensive and guidance oriented.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institute has been incessantly striving to accomplish its mission of achieving academic excellence by offering high quality education. During the last five years, 12 programmes are being offered at P.G. level and 06 at U.G. level. B.Com. Honours programme has been introduced from 2018-19. There has been a consistent rise in the number of students admitted. The college strictly adheres to the rules, regulations and guidelines issued by the Higher Education Department, Madhya Pradesh. The admissions are done at the level of Higher Education Department and the seat allotment is also done by the department. The students from diverse backgrounds take admission in the college to pursue their dreams and ambitions.

The college is marching ahead in the quest for excellence with the dedicated team of 85 full times faculty members. Most of them have Ph.D. degree and 33 are recognized research guides. The average pass percentage of the last five years is 91 percent. It is worth mentioning that in the University Merit List declared in the year 2019, first three positions in Sanskrit, first position in Urdu, first two positions in Political Science and all five positions in Fine Arts were occupied by our college. The institute offers the students every possible opportunity of learning within and outside the classroom. Creativity, positivity and vibrancy have been integrated in the ethos of our college. A glimpse of this creativity, resilience and High Adversity Quotient of

our students was seen during testing Covid times. The students of our college initiated Awareness drives, Blood donations camps and distributed food packets to the less privileged. It is indeed gratifying to behold their enthusiastic and vibrant response to the needs of the society. The college organizes a string of activities like debates, field trips, quiz, role play, poster presentation, group work, slogan-writing, workshops, industrial visits, exposure visits, and participation in career fairs to enhance learning and nurture creativity.

E content materials are provided to supplement classroom teaching. Expert lectures, webinars, trainings are regularly held which go a long way in broadening the learning spectrum of the students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college also organizes a number of community services activities. The outreach activities of our college have been phenomenal. The college has initiated and organized activities like- Cleanliness drives, environmental awareness campaigns, health checkup camps, plantation, literacy campaigns, voter awareness campaigns, AIDS awareness, tobacco harms awareness, digital literacy, financial literacy program and various other activities. The villages Hinauti Sadak and Bhoyi pura have been adopted by the N.S.S. Unit .

A number of initiatives have been taken to build a robust innovation ecosystem in the institute. The faculty members of the college have been significantly contributing to research in myriad spheres. A number of books and research papers have been published by the faculty in the research journals in the last five years. They have participated, presented papers, chaired the sessions and have been resource persons in a number of seminars, workshops and symposiums at national and international level. A number of books have been published by the faculty members in the last five years. The college is the research center for PhD. 33 faculty members of our college are Ph.D. guides. Pre Ph.D. Vivas are held regularly which go a long way in promoting research culture in the institute. More than hundred PhDs were awarded under the guidance of the faculty members in the last five years. Inter faculty research journal is being regularly published by the college.

A seminar on Contemporary Research in Commerce and Management was organized by the Department of Commerce in September 2019. Lectures of eminent experts are regularly held. Seminars, workshops, webinars and discourses are organized to keep the students updated with the latest trends and nurture creative thinking. Short term trainings on skill development are held in the wake of changing dimensions of education globally. The college in collaboration with RCVP Noronha Academy conducted the COMMIT Training for their teaching and non-teaching staff. Industrial visits are organized regularly by Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Cell to promote vestibule learning. The teachers regularly participate in Faculty Development Programmes. 02 MOUs have been signed and a number of MOUs are on the on anvil.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has well maintained campus spread over 29012.24 square meters of land. The Administrative Block of the college is in the center of the campus. The Principal's chamber is in the A Block.

There are 25 classrooms out of which 05 are smart classrooms and a Virtual Classroom which has ICT facility for presentation, animation and graphics for detailed explanation of lectures.

There are four well-functioning labs, furnished with latest equipments. These are Computer Lab, Geography Lab, Psychology Lab and two labs of Fine Arts.

The college has a Multipurpose Hall, Seminar Hall and a Conference Hall. The Multipurpose Hall (Swarna Jayanti Sabhagar) is being used for seminars, Yoga, Indoor games and a plethora of literary and cultural activities.

There are adequate number of washrooms for boys, girls and staff. The washrooms are always spic and span. The college has a rich library having around 127935 books for the students. The library has sufficient learning resources, both physical and e-resources like membership of N-LIST which facilitates access to more than 6000 e-journals and above one lakh e-books. Library is partially automated and complete automation process is in progress.

The college has 14 Teaching Departments. Each department has a departmental library and a computer system with internet.

The college also has a Network Resource Centre (NRC) to facilitate optimum use of information technology in teaching learning. As the college is totally committed to its aim of the holistic development of the students, we have adequate facilities to ensure and promote active participation of the students in sports activities. We have facilities for outdoor games such as play ground for Basket Ball, Volley Ball, Kabaddi, Karate and Ball Badminton. We also have facilities for indoor games such as Table Tennis, Carrom, Chess, Judo and Badminton. The college also has a Canteen, Sick room, IQAC room, Virtual classroom, N.S.S. room, N.C.C. room, Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Cell and Placement Cell. There are facilities like ramps and washrooms for differently abled. Drinking water facility is available. There is enough parking space for two wheelers and four wheelers available in the institute.

Student Support and Progression

Institute has consistently been involved in Student Support and progression activities be it via various scholarships granted by the Institution on behalf of the government like Post Matric Scholarship, Awas Yojna, Vikramaditya Nishulk Shiksha Yojna for poor students and Mukhya Mantri Medhavi Vidarthi Yojna. Dr. O.N. Shrivastava Pratibha Samman Meritorious Scholarship in Commerce and Arts is given as a freeship to further support and motivate students excelling in studies. Apart from financial support, various capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives have also been undertaken by the institute for the holistic development of students be it soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills and ICT/Computing skills. The Institution has also been actively involved in providing Competitive and Career Guidance but it still has a long way to go in this direction. The beneficiaries of these programs have consistently been increasing. The institution is relentlessly making efforts in this direction to ensure increased placements and success in examinations.

The institution also has a well-organized and coordinated mechanism to timely redress student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. Committees are reconstituted at the start of every session and carefully monitor and act as per policy guidelines. The policy of Zero tolerance towards ragging has been adopted by the college. Students' representation and engagements in various administrative bodies like IQAC, Anti Ragging Cell, NSS, Amalgamated Funds (AF) etc. is also being ensured. Student union elections are held as per Department of Higher Education advisories and guidelines to imbibe democratic and participative decision-making process besides inculcating responsible behavior amongst students.

The Institute also has an impressive list of alumni who are significantly contributing in various ways towards the progress and development of the institute. The Alumni association has been registered recently which is a

significant milestone in this direction. We have a close network of connectivity with our Alumni spread all across and holding eminent positions since the year 1946 (our establishment year). They have been providing all possible help as and when required and are made an integral part of our policy and decision-making process by their membership in Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC).

Governance, Leadership and Management

For day-to-day functioning the college takes guidance from its vision, which aims at universal access to quality education, with full utilization of human potential. It endeavours to make teaching and learning relevant in present scenario. Principal is the highest authority to take decisions, who is guided by the orders issued by the Dept of Higher Education MP. The college has a well-defined organizational structure, with decentralized powers conferred to Head of the Departments and convenors of various functioning committees. The Anti-Ragging and Discipline committee follows Zero tolerance policy on ragging. In financial matters, the Principal is assisted by Drawing & Disbursing Officer, who also ensures regular audit of accounts. The college follows govt guideline on e-governance for admissions, examinations, finance and accounts. As regards the welfare measures for faculty and staff, the college follows government rules for various types of leaves, provident fund, pay advance etc.

The college has an Internal audit Committee that ensures financial transparency, the issues regarding budget, income and expenditure. It tallies the fee received from students. The IQAC consistently strives to institutionalize quality assurance strategy and processes every level of functioning of the College by enhancing the effectiveness of Teacher attributes and focusing on multidimensional development of students

The teaching faculty is encouraged to participate in workshops, seminars, and conferences in other organizations to upgrade their knowledge and skills, with financial support from the college. The college takes initiatives towards resource mobilisation and generation of funds from various sources for campus and infrastructure development and scholarships. These include non-govt bodies like *Janbhagidari* and O.N. Srivastava Scholarship. Role of IQAC is notable in upgrading of college infrastructure.

IQAC takes initiatives towards sustenance and quality enhancement. As per the guidelines of NAAC, more ICT measures have been incorporated in teaching and learning process. Faculty empowerment strategies include Induction programmes, Performance Appraisal and Feedback. IQAC is involved in planning, auditing performance, examining strategic issues and in maintaining quality parameters.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Govt Hamidia Arts & Commerce College takes pride in its core values, which is integrity with the highest standards in academic, professional, and ethical spheres. Gender equality and women empowerment are among its top agenda. Gender related activities to sensitize students in the campus are conducted. Equal and respectful treatment towards fellow women staff members and students, their safety and security are ensured as per provisions of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace. Students and Faculty are given counselling and sensitized through special lectures on workplace etiquette, ethics, respect, and tolerance towards the opposite sex.

On the environment front, the institution first adopted polythene-free practices; with installation of a 5 KV functioning solar system thus reducing its carbon footprint. Measures are taken to segregate different types of

waste generated in the campus; e-waste is stored separately for disposal. The no-plastic oath taken by students goes a long way in maintaining entire surroundings clean. Hamidia has adopted three nearby villages for spreading awareness on cleanliness and hygiene. Students interact with villagers, distribute pamphlets, write slogans, and play *Nukkad Natak*. With respect and sensitivity towards differently abled persons, separate washroom and ramps are provided. The spirit of national integrity is instilled among students by celebrating national festivals and anniversaries of eminent personalities. 'Book of Ethics' and Code of Conduct is uploaded on website.

Two best practices of the college – Yoga & Meditation and Holistic Development – help students maintain balance between mind and body. Students have excelled in several sports and won laurels for the institution at International, National, and State level. Hamidia has been part of cultural exchange programme with north-eastern states. Distinctiveness of the college is Social Responsibility and Commitment. The students campaigned to help flood victims of Kerala and carried out several awareness drives in Bhopal city and nearby villages, like need of social distancing and sanitization, free food distribution during COVID lockdown, Digital India initiative, disaster management, voters' awareness, etc.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college is making concerted efforts to ensure effective curriculum delivery in order to achieve excellence in teaching learning. A well formulated mechanism has been adopted by the college which is in accordance with the directives of the Department of Higher Education, M.P. Govt. Monthly Teaching Plan is prepared by each teacher in congruence with the syllabus of the allotted class. As the college is affiliated to Barkatullah University, Bhopal, the syllabus is designed by the University. To ensure effective delivery of course curriculum, the teaching methods adopted are traditional methods, on line classes, Power Point Presentation and collaborative learning. The overall involvement of the student is ensured by the teacher throughout the lecture. Elaborate lecture plan is scrupulously devised by the teacher stating the objective and topics covered. The teaching plans are displayed on the notice board in advance.

Effective and meticulous teaching is ensured by regular maintenance of attendance register and Teaching Diary by the teacher which are duly signed by the Head of the Department and the Principal at the end of every month. A coalesce of traditional and non- traditional methods is used for teaching. The teaching planners are prepared by the faculty members after detailed apportionment of the syllabus among all the faculties of a particular department. The students are permitted to fill examination forms and avail scholarships on the basis of their attendance. In case of leave taken by the teacher the class is assigned to some other faculty so that the curriculum does not lag behind. Department of Higher Education (M.P. Govt.) conducts virtual classes for the students. The college motivates them to attend these classes which augments their learning. Departmental Time Table is made according to the time slot provided in the main Time Table which is strictly followed by all the teachers. The completion of the course curriculum within the scheduled time frame is ensured by all the faculty members. The various teaching departments strive for effective curriculum delivery through innovative and student centric methods. In the commencement of the session an assessment of the students' aptitude and expectations relating to the course is made. A meticulous plan is devised accordingly based on the teaching calendar; comprehensive enough to cover the available time frame, yet sufficiently flexible to allow changes. All the decisions regarding curriculum delivery are taken after consultation and deliberations among faculties in departmental meetings. Faculty members take utmost care to ensure timely completion of entire syllabus. As we have diverse variety of students, we adopt multi-pronged strategy in curriculum delivery for providing equitable, inclusive and quality education. There is also a provision for Remedial Classes to help the weak students.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

Our College is a Government College, affiliated to Barkatullah University. Hence, there are some limitations in introducing relevant topics in the curriculum. However, there are contents in the syllabus of Barkatullah University integrating issues relevant to gender, human values and environment. All the Under Graduate Courses have compulsory paper Foundation Course- 'Moral Values and Language'. This Course goes a long way in making the students acquainted with Indian culture and human values. Foundation Course II year includes Environmental Studies which inculcates awareness regarding environmental issues.

The topic "Role of women in the Indian National Movement" has been included in B.A. III, Paper- History of India from 1858 AD to 1950 AD. In the Paper, History of India from 1740-1857AD, Role of Women in

Freedom Struggle is included.

B.A. I Sociology, Paper- Indian Society discusses gender inequality at length. B.A. II Sociology, Paper Social Processes and change enumerates various special laws relating to women's safety.

B.A. I Sociology, Paper- Rural, Urban and Tribal Society contains myriad issues related to Indian women.

B.A. I, Geography, Paper- Introduction to geography and human geography includes significant perspectives of the relationship between humans and environment. In the paper- Environment and Resource analysis the interdependence of resource and environment is analyzed and it deals with issues like biodiversity and sustainable development.

In M.A. III Semester History- Paper, "Women in Indian History", the position of women in reform movement has been analyzed.

The Department of Sociology organized seminars, group discussions and lectures on relevant issues. The Activity club of the department organized a seminar on the topic corruption versus courtesy on 26-02-15. A discourse on Environmental Awareness was held on 27.11.17 .

In English Literature, the compositions of sapient literary luminaries like Tagore and Sri Aurobindo acquaint the students with India's rich cultural heritage. The profound works of J.L. Krishnamurty and S. Radhakrishnan beautifully portray moral, social and human values. The works of women writers –Virginia Woolf, Kamala Das, Shashi Deshpandey foster gender sensitivity and raise ideas and concerns regarding double standards, restrictions, challenges and equality. Poetic compositions of Wordsworth, Shelley, Keats and Blake passionately urge to return to nature.

The socially relevant issues relating to gender, human values and professional ethics have been integrated into the larger framework of the syllabus through a series of activities which ensure to keep these significant and crucial discourses in the heart of curriculum delivery. As raising environmental awareness in the students is of paramount significance, a Green Club has been constituted in the college which has been constantly striving to heighten concern regarding environmental issues. A number of activities like planting saplings, slogan writing, poster making, essay writing and discourses on environmental issues, waste management, water conservation and cleanliness are regularly organized by the club. The Cultural Club of the college has been organizing multifarious activities like creative writing debates, elocution,

drama, dance, group song, painting , poetry writing and group discussions to promote national integration and restoration of cultural values.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Slow learners and advanced learners are identified by the various teaching departments of the college. The identification is done through academic performance of the previous year, personal interaction, Question-Answer Session, Quiz, interviewing and marks in C.C.E.. The endeavors made for the enhancement of the intellectual capability of slow learners are special lectures, doubt-solving sessions, individual guidance and use of ICT tools. All Departments offer remedial classes to help overcome learning difficulties in regular class. Remedial classes are scheduled after regular classes. The students who are identified as advanced learners are given opportunities to excel by ensuring their participation in National, University and District level Competitions. They are also given special trainings to augment their skills. Brain storming, text book reading, debates, discourses; group-discussions have proved to be significant milestones in enhancing cognitive abilities and enriching the intellectual curiosity of both slow and advanced learners.

Activities organized for slow learners:

1. Special attention is paid on slow learners in the class so that they are not left out. Individual guidance and counseling by the faculty in the class goes a long way in boosting confidence and improving the performance in exams.
2. Motivational lectures, expert talks, discourses are arranged throughout the session.
3. Books, notes, questions papers of previous years are provided. They are given tips on answer writing in exams.
4. Doubt solving sessions are organized by the various departments.
5. Remedial Classes are regularly conducted in the college for weak students. Difficult topics are identified and taken up in these classes. There is a special time slot allotted for remedial classes in the time table. The faculty members go an extra mile to ensure that the weak students grasp and comprehend the topic taken up in these classes. A separate committee has been constituted to monitor the teaching learning in the class. The feedback is taken from the students time to time and required changes are made.

Activities undertaken for advanced learners:

The college takes every possible measure to enhance the talent of the advanced learners:

1. The advanced learners are motivated to participate in various literary, academic, cultural and co-curricular activities held in the college.
2. They are given notes and provided links on web for extra study material.
3. They are encouraged to go beyond the syllabus and explore more on the subject.
4. They are given guidance to excel in their respective spheres.

The result of the endeavours made for the advanced learners is reflected in the scintillating performance of the students in the University exams.

It is worth mentioning that in the university merit list declared in the year 2019, first three positions in Sanskrit, first position in Urdu, first two positions in Political Science and all five positions in Fine Arts were occupied by our college. The brilliant performance of the students speaks volumes of the collaborated efforts of teachers and students.

Response:

The progress, quality and standard of a college vastly depends on the student centric methods adopted by the institute. Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce College has been incessantly striving to elevate the students to a higher level of knowledge, competence and creativity. The course outcomes, programme outcomes and specific programme outcomes are constantly measured by assessment and evaluation done by the faculty members of the concerned department. There is a committee which regularly monitors the attainment of course outcomes and gives guidelines to the concerned departments. 3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

The Institution has built a robust innovation ecosystem for innovation and transfer of knowledge through the activities of various committees.

- Interdisciplinary journal “*Antarsankay shodhpartika*” publishes research papers of faculty of the institute as well as of other local colleges; faculty of other colleges are members of the editorial board.
- 90 hours job oriented training was given by State University New York under MOU, with the Department of Technical Education. Self-employment training in collaboration with National Education Foundation (NEF) and National Skill Development Council (NSDC), Micro small & Medium Scale enterprises (MSME).
- Industrial visits are organized by Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Cell to promote Vestibule learning.
- Induction programme, Remedial Coaching Classes and training on Personality Development and Communication skills are organized for the transfer of knowledge to the students.

- Virtual classes are conducted from the setcom at RCVP Naronha Academy of Administration. More than 10 faculty are engaging classes from the institute.
- Career fairs are organized annually which help in giving exposure to employment opportunities. Dainik Bhaskar Group organized a competition on career options at the college.
- Our Institute in collaboration with RCVP Noronha Academy of Administration conducted the COMMIT (Comprehensive Online Modified Modules of Induction Training) training for their teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The college is a Research Centre for 10 disciplines, 146 Pre Ph.D. Viva's were held in the college. More than 100 Ph.D.'s are awarded during the last 5 years.
- Teachers of the college frequently use ICT enabled tools and resources in classes. The students are familiar with technology based learning methods. The platform of Google & Zoom were used which were later used for webinars.
- The 64th conference of All India Philosophy Association was organized in RCVP Naronha Academy of Administrative from 19-21 October 2019 which was inaugurated by the Honorable Governor. 128 Papers were read and the students of Drawing & Painting Department sketched the caricatures related to the papers read in the conference.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The College has sufficient infrastructure to facilitate quality learning experience to the students. The classrooms are well ventilated and equipped with furniture, lights and fans to provide a gratifying experience to the learners. There are 25 class rooms, out of which 05 are smart classrooms. The classes are also being held in the departments as well as corridors since C Block has been dismantled. We have well equipped 04 Labs, 02 Seminar halls with ICT facility, reading room, Girls common room, Boys common room and sick room with first aid facility.

The Library has adequate number of learning resources: physical and e-resources like membership of N-List which facilitates access to more than 6000 journals and above one lakh-books. The library has 127935 books available for students. The college has taken membership of Indian Economic Association and subscribes magazines and newspapers to keep the students updated with recent trends. Reading corner for students has been provided where they can take down notes from reference books. Photo copy facility for the students is also available. They can also take the printouts of the relevant study material.

The college is endowed with lush green campus. The campus is LAN enabled with 24/7 internet facility. The college regularly updates the infrastructure and learning resources to keep pace with the changing requirements. During the last five years physical infrastructure of the college has seen a significant expansion and updation through the construction of on-line counseling center, Seminar Hall and Multipurpose Hall. Abhivyakti Block, Computer Lab, the washrooms, as well as the canteen have been renovated. A pathway connecting all the blocks has been constructed. The college has well defined mechanism for updating Information Technology infrastructure to meet current technical requirements. A provision is made in the Annual Budget for maintenance and upkeep of Information Technology infrastructure. We have a Lease Line dedicated for the college with LAN facility in the entire campus. Earlier we had Bandwidth 100 MBPS. Network Resource Centre (NRC) has been set up to facilitate optimum use of information technology. The main objective of the NRC is to create awareness and give exposure to both teaching faculty and the students about the uses of Information Technology. The centre facilitates the use of multimedia for academic pursuits. The NRC opens from 12:00 to 2:00 on all working days. The certificate course 'Libre office', spoken tutorial developed by the students of IIT Mumbai was run by the NRC in the session 2017-18. The Lingua Skill Test conducted by Cambridge University UK was held in the NRC in the session 2019-20. In the time of the pandemic, online classes and webinars are being conducted in the NRC. There is a virtual class in the college to facilitate online content delivery amongst the students. It is worth mentioning that there are only 02 such centers in

the whole of Bhopal District.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

The college has a structured mechanism to ensure the maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities. There are sufficient number of class rooms for routine classes and Seminar Halls for cultural, literary and co-curricular activities. We have a clean and green campus endowed with rich flora and fauna which provides a pristine backdrop for effective learning experience. There is a system in place for maintaining the cleanliness of the campus as a result of which the college has won many awards for cleanliness mission and set a benchmark in this sphere. The class rooms and washrooms are also always spic and span. There are separate washrooms in every block with adequate facility for female faculty members and girl students.

A Campus Committee has been appointed which regularly monitors the cleanliness of the campus and takes initiatives like plantation, cleanliness drives and other activities for the beautification of the campus. Separate dustbins have been installed in the campus to dispose of biodegradable and plastic waste.

The smooth and effective functioning of the library is ensured by the library committee led by the Principal. The college has been incessantly striving for the upgradation and extension of facilities to provide an intellectual milieu conducive to teaching-learning. Stock verification of the books is done every year as per the norms by the verification committee appointed by the principal. Library also seeks recommendations from various Departments to purchase books and journals to keep the library updated. The dusting and cleaning of the books is done on regular basis. The Library also has a display board where important information regarding new arrivals in books & journals and upcoming events are shared.

The college has a set and organized mechanism for regular updating and maintenance of Information Technology Infrastructure. The college has 133 computers out of which 65 are exclusively for the students. These 65 computers are with access internet facility. Network Resource Centre has been set up to facilitate optimum use of information technology in teaching learning. The NRC opens from 12.00 noon to 2 pm on all working days and record is scrupulously maintained on daily basis. A committee has been constituted by the Principal with the objective to help the students to have an access to multimedia for academic

pursuits. The steps like installation of antivirus, periodically formatting of computers, maintenance of hardware, updation of software are regularly taken to ensure smooth functioning of the facilities.

The college is leaving no stone unturned in promoting sports and games. An environment for sports and games is facilitated to the students by providing sufficient support system so as to ensure the perceived idea to become a reality. There is a separate administrative room for sports. The sport officer takes every possible measure to strengthen and enrich sports activities in the campus. The students are trained for different sporting events as a result of which our students have won accolades at various sports events at state and national levels.

The cultural committee has been set up to promote cultural activities in the college. There is a Multipurpose Hall to facilitate practice sessions for different cultural activities such as Music, Dance, Drama etc. As it is of paramount significance to heighten environmental awareness, a Green Club has been constituted to inculcate and promote knowledge and concern regarding clean and green environment. A number of Green initiatives are adopted in the college to inculcate environmentally responsible behavior in the students. Green audit is conducted on regular basis. The focus has been on green energy and renewable resources. A Solar Plant has been installed in the campus.

There is building maintenance committee to ensure the cleanliness of the building and washrooms. Canteen committee has been set up to regularly monitor the quality of the services provided. As it is imperative to ensure proper hygiene and sanitation the concerned committees regularly inspect the campus and take required decisions and appropriate actions.

5.3.2 Institution facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative, co-curricular and extracurricular activities following duly established processes and norms (student council, students representation on various bodies)

Response:

The institution has consistently facilitated student's representation and engagement in various administrative, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities following duly established government norms and processes. Being a Government college, the formation of various bodies and representation of students on it is as per instructions of the Department of Higher Education, Madhya Pradesh. In accordance, students are actively represented as members and participants on various academic and administrative bodies.

In the last five years, elections were conducted for formation of Students Council as per Government orders in the session 2017-18 with the aim of fostering democratic values and leadership qualities amongst students. The council formation also aimed at making students realize their efficacy in contributing towards activities for the betterment of students, college and society at large. As per instructions of the Dept. of Higher Education, Madhya Pradesh, elections were held on 23/10/2017 for the post of President, Vice-President, Joint- Secretary and Secretary apart from 10 class representatives. It was ensured, as per Government norms that the Complaint Redressal Cell formed for fair elections also comprised of two students nominated on the panel. As per Government instruction Rupees 95 is collected from each students on admission to the college for students council activities. Even in the sessions election were not conducted this money was constructively used for various student welfare activities such as library up gradation, Yuva Utsav and cultural programs like Annual day celebrations, awareness drives etc.

Students are also actively represented in the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Anti Ragging bodies with a student representative made active member in the IQAC and four students made members in

the Anti-Ragging body. It has also been ensured that two student representatives are associated as members in the Amalgamated Fund (AF) used for various activities pursued for college improvement. Students are also engaged in various Cultural and Sports, NSS & NCC activities. Volunteers of NSS and other departments are also actively engaged in social, literary and cultural activities throughout the session. Students are actively involved in organizing and conducting as well as participating and winning laurels in various activities.

Though the college has formally registered its alumni association on 22nd January 2021 with a society registration number 01/01/01/37394/21, the college has an impressive list of alumni and has been closely associated with them over the years. The college has a network of connectivity with its former students who have passed out and has 96 members enrolled in its association. In accordance, a hugely successful alumni meet was organized on 10/01/2020 which witnessed alumni's from Hamidia's 1946 (1st Batch) in attendance. New registration drives and feedback forms were distributed at this event. 68 alumni joined and committed themselves towards future endeavors undertaken by the college.

Prior to these events, alumni committee of the college in a meet on 02/01/2020 decided to initiate a mass drive to reconnect with alumni spread all across the country via social media platforms. Since the year 2017 alumni meets are being organized and the college has been taking steps towards formalizing this equation between past and present generations of Hamidia. Also attempts are being made to institutionalize and channel these resources for welfare and benefit of present and future Hamidians.

Outstanding alumni of the college, be it in the field of politics, business, literature, law, journalism, sports, culture, arts etc. attempts are being made to use their knowledge and expertise for lectures, guidance, policy making, financial assistance, other contributions and support services for welfare and development of the college and students. 6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of and in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

Response:

VISION

An acclaimed centre of learning having universal access to quality education, that utilizes full human potential in order to develop an equitable and responsible society working towards nation building.

MISSION

To achieve academic excellence by offering high quality education, through integration of intellectual curiosity and ethical values to equip the students for the challenges of the 21st century.

The college targets multifarious activities to build strong, responsible and just environment, where the teaching faculty and students collaborate for knowledge and skill enhancement, incorporation of quality parameters in every endeavour and strive for attaining excellence.

The students are exposed to best standards both in the classroom environment and to real life situations. Regular interaction with the people of eminence, attachment with grassroot level social organisations and their hands-on experience in mitigation of difficulties of citizens in distress, help in enhancing commitment and sincerity, thus developing students as responsible citizens.

Nature of Governance—Hamidia College follows participatory approach of administration and governance. Working under the Department of Higher Education, Government of MP, is affiliated to Barkatullah University, Bhopal (BU) and is one of the State's premiere institutions. The Principal, in regular coordination with members of teaching faculty and non-teaching staff, discusses plans and executes policies laid down by the government in academic matters. The college follows guidelines of Barkatullah University. Due representation of students is ensured in various student-related affairs through various committees.

Designated as Lead College of Bhopal in year 1998, it has 12 govt colleges and 07 government aided colleges in its jurisdiction. Principal reports to the Additional Director, Bhopal Division and Commissioner, HE. Information related to admissions, scholarships, examinations, position of employees, maintenance of rosters of non-gazetted staff, Assembly and Parliament questions, etc. is compiled and transmitted to the higher authorities. Verification and registration of forms for admission in B.Ed. colleges of Bhopal is also carried out here. Principal is the investigating officer in disciplinary matters and officer-in-charge in court cases related to all colleges. Feedback from students and staff is done. Principal takes final decision in academic and administrative matters, in consultation with faculty members.

Perspective Plan—The perspective plan of College incorporates provision for:

- Lectures and activities to create awareness about gender equity, reduce language barriers and

develop overall personality.

- Upgrading class rooms to provide better learning environment.
- Proposal for language laboratory
- Conducting Yoga and meditation camps for teaching/non-teaching staff and students.
- Possession of auditorium
- Promote Nation building activities.

Participation of Teachers in decision making bodies –

- All teachers are members of one or the other committee that works for smooth conduct of numerous college affairs, like- admissions, Anti-ragging, discipline, women empowerment, timetable, curriculum, IQAC, library, research, etc.
- The staff council comprises entire teaching staff who participate and opine on academic, administrative and other matters.
- Few members are chairperson, Boards of Studies at Barkatullah University, and few are members. Their suggestions help in deciding courses and updating of syllabus.
- Teachers actively take part and guide students in cultural & social activities, viz. NSS, Green-club, sports, etc.

6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Response:

A case study of decentralization in participative management at Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce college-

Principal is the administrative and academic Head, followed by departmental Heads. The college has a practice of providing opportunity to all stakeholders for participating in the decision making.

Heads of all departments hold meetings with the members of the department. Recommendations are then sent to the Principal, who, in consultation with department heads arrives at the final decision. In office matters, the principal is aided by Head Clerk and other non-teaching staff. The college follows norms, rules and regulations laid down by the Government and UGC in academic and administrative aspects.

The college follows the motto 'Let's all grow together'. As many as 45 committees independently, yet in cooperation, function to look after various issues like, academic, cultural, social, sports, personality enhancement, career and placement, discipline, gender equality, scholarships, college infrastructure, etc., on a day-to-day basis. Due representation of students is ensured in relevant committees. This also helps the

college administration to approach all groups of students and to better understand their aspirations.

- Teachers in-charge of different committees function independently with their leadership skills; thereafter hold discussions with the principal/ IQAC/ HOD' s etc., as required.
- Apart from the academic role, the teaching faculty fulfils its extra-academic and administrative responsibilities looking after numerous other jobs like, IQAC, timetable management, purchase, IT related issues, Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance cell, teacher-guardian interaction, Women empowerment and anti-harassment, income tax and salary fixation, audits, alumni affairs, RUSA/World Bank projects, RTI, scholarships, NCC, NSS, sports, literary and cultural events, etc.
- Coordinators of various committees frame objectives and plan of action for the academic calendar. Students are also allowed to participate in these activities. Likewise, the head clerk, for administrative work and coordination with BU and HE Dept., holds dialogue with the concerned on admission scheme, fee submission, examinations, scholarships and related matters.
- Students participate and share responsibilities in activities related to literary and cultural committees under the guidance of respective teachers.
- “*Jan Bhagidari Samiti of the College*” is an advisory body of local citizens, whose chairman is government nominee. Principal functions as its secretary. The committee has representation from MPs and MLAs, industry people, person from agriculture background, an ST member and one woman representative.
- The RUSA chalks out the plan of action for IDP.

The Anti-Ragging and Discipline committee is a case in study. With Principal as convener, it has three senior faculty members, one member each from district administration, Police, and media, four student representatives and one representative each from guardians and local counsellor. The college follows Zero Tolerance Policy on ragging. At the time of admission, students are counselled for maintaining discipline and adherence to govt guideline. Complaint box is placed in front of Principal chamber. Again, the Induction Program, emphasizes on legal provisions related to ragging. Senior students duly work as mentors and guide their juniors on the campus. With this there has not been any case of ragging during the last 05 years.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

Strategic Perspective Plan- Effective Deployment

The Govt. Hamidia Arts & Commerce College religiously follows government policies and plans to bring excellence in higher education and to raise and ensure quality standards. All-round development of the

students is our aim, so that they can confidently face the challenges of a highly competitive world. The task of the Principal is stimulating as he/she is not only the academic and administrative head, but also because he/she is the Principal of the lead college of Bhopal having eighteen other colleges under its jurisdiction. The college collects, compiles and sends information to Department of Higher Education regarding admissions, scholarships, number of employees, non-gazetted roster of Bhopal, Assembly queries from all colleges. The responsibility of verification and registration of forms of B.Ed. students, also vests with this college. Principal of college functions as investigating officer and Officer in-Charge in disciplinary and legal matters. He distributes miscellaneous works to individuals or designated committees to carry-out the plans envisioned by the Department of HE. Hamidia College is the centre of various activities pertaining to various awareness drives, election, *swachchhata*, health & hygiene, COVID related issues, etc. The faculty members actively participate in undertaking and implementing govt schemes and programmes. The staff council meets every three months to assess, review and discuss the implementation of such plans.

Of late, IQAC has been focusing on creating an environment that nurtures research, benefiting senior students by arranging guest lectures from expert faculty of various institutions. Teachers motivate their students by using student centric teaching methods. Regular feedback is taken from all stakeholders and necessary action taken after analysis of the feedback.

The College has very successfully undertaken Rashtriya Uchtar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). One of the selected 200 govt colleges in this project (started in 2015-16), this college submitted Draft Plan Report on 13 components of RUSA, getting the first grant of Rs 2 crore. The fund received was utilized under the following heads:

35% - New Construction

35% - Renovation

30% - Apparatus and equipment

Project Implementation Unit supervised new constructions, renovation works and equipment purchase, etc., as follows:

- Online counseling center (G+1)
- Pathway to connect four main blocks – A,B,P,H.
- Under renovation – 'Abhivyakti' Block was upgraded; all the washrooms in the campus were renovated and upgraded; computer lab upgraded.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

Response:

All rules and regulation of the department of Higher Education and the office of Additional Director, Bhopal-Hoshangabad region are followed in totality. Being the lead college of Bhopal, orders received from the higher level are sent to the government/government aided and private colleges under the jurisdiction.

The Principal is the head of the institution, supported by heads of various departments, including heads of teaching departments, semester cell, IQAC, sports officer, registrar, and librarians.

Academic decisions are taken on the advice of the HODs, senior faculty members and IQAC.

Matters related to examination are taken care of by the semester cell under the supervision of the Principal.

Administrative decisions are taken with the approval of *Janbhagidari* committee and staff council, Finance, purchase and budget related matters are handled by the finance/purchase committee.

The final decisions are taken by the Principal according to the rules of the Govt. and the affiliating University, on the recommendations of HODs or Conveners of various committees, as follows-

- **Academic** HODs in active consultation with their faculty members and IQAC suggest measures which are finally approved by the Principal in consultation with the HODs.
- **Examination** Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce College is affiliated to Barkatullah University Bhopal, and the external examinations are conducted by BU, Bhopal. The Semester Cell monitors the CCE, compiles the internal marks from all departments and upload on portal of Barkatullah University.

- **Financial** Purchases are made as per the store and purchase rules of MP govt. following recommendations of purchase committee. Unusable store items are disposed off after the

recommendation of the write off committee.

The Functions of Various bodies:-

- The Institution has a finance committee, planning board, RUSA and IQAC. They take important decisions related to finance, construction and development work renovation and maintenance of many other issues related to the institute. The staff council and the non-teaching faculty staff gives their suggestion in all development plans.
- The courses run for self-finance- BBA, BCA, B.Com. (Computer Application), and B.Com (Honors) appointment for this is done by Higher Education level.

Appointment:-

- Hamidia College is a government institution. The college has no power for appointment- either teaching or non-teaching; temporary appointment is done by the government.

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff**Response:**

Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce College believes in maintaining healthy and congenial working environment. The institution focuses constantly on career development opportunities, personal health consciousness, friendly interpersonal relationship in the campus, awareness about environment, etc. Involvement of teaching faculty, non-teaching staff and students is ensured in all such pursuits. For e.g.-

- Recognizing the need of regular updation of knowledge, technology and skills, members of the teaching staff are encouraged to attend seminars, webinars, conferences, workshops and training programs, both in the college and in other institutions within the state and outside too.
- In order to make teaching and learning process effective, interesting and imbibing, 05 smart classrooms are functioning. Additionally, there is one virtual classroom, where almost 10 professors of the college take sessions from Setcom at Academy; these classes are relayed in almost 90 colleges of Madhya Pradesh.
- Yoga and meditation are the best practices of Hamidia college where all teaching and non-teaching staff and students participate thus able to make a perfect life and work balance.
- Health checkup camps are also organized with the help of NSS volunteers for the welfare of teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Technology has its important role in the improvement of the functioning of the college, with this objective the non-teaching staff is compulsorily sent for computer training in addition to training on matters related to accounts and procedure, office management etc. COMMIT training was organized by college for both teaching faculty and non-teaching staff in a 15 days Blended learning programme, 8 hours of face to face training and rest as online modules.
- Rules related to sanction of various kinds of leaves, providing pay advances, withdrawal from Provident fund, leave encashment, etc. are followed as per established govt. procedure. Group insurance, festival advance, festival Bonus etc. are given as per the government orders. Uniform is also provided to class 4, every year and woollens are provided once in every 3 years.
- User friendly ramps and washrooms have been constructed for physically challenged staff.
- Amenities like Canteen facility, parking space, clean drinking water facility, water coolers, are provided
- The college has initiated cash award for class IV employee for rendering their services. This is given as a token on Republic day.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

As regards the teaching faculty, Self-Appraisal Forms have been prescribed by the dept. of HE. Each faculty member submits their Self-Appraisal Report describing work assigned, achievements, additional tasks performed with respect to the academic calendar. They also describe participation in various committees, seminars and conferences, conduct of examination, publication of Research papers, functioning as research Guides, etc. Self-appraisal forms are forwarded by Head of the Departments, then IQAC assess these forms of teaching faculty and then forward to the Principal for writing his final comments. There is a system of taking feedback from students on the performance of the teachers. Similarly, for class three non teaching staff, Self Appraisal report is obtained in their respective prescribed forms by the Principal for giving his assessment report.

The college follows a systematic Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff. The institution / management evaluates teachers based on teaching, research and participation in development activities and due importance is given to all the activities. The institution evaluates non-teaching staff based on performance in technical work and administration related activities, co-curricular, professional, development related activities, academic contributions, general conduct and qualities. A structured “Self-Appraisal Form” is used by each faculty member for this purpose, wherein he/she gives the details of his/her performance and participation in all the activities assigned to him/her by the department /college. The concerned HOD give their remarks on the performance of the faculty members. The faculty performance appraisal system is evaluated in six categories viz. Teaching-learning, co-curricular activities, research activities, academic performance- evaluated from the feedback from students, expert review feedback and management feedback. Every category has a maximum score of 150 out of which the minimum requirement is 75.

The appraisal is done by the Additional Director of Education and by the Commissioner of Department of Higher Education. The criteria for scoring a good grade is performance of students, teacher’s guidance for research, peer reviewed publications in research journals, books published, funding projects, recognition by professional bodies etc.

The performance of Non-teaching staff is monitored by the head of the institution. A confidential self-appraisal report of each non-teaching staff is prepared by the principal and entered in the service book.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Hamidia College being a government college, regular audit is done by the government agencies from time to time.

Internal Audit

The Hamidia College has an Internal audit Committee that ensures financial transparency, the issues regarding budget, income and expenditure. This committee, tally the fee received from students with DFC (Daily fee Collection), Bank statement and cash, book any irregularities are reported to the Principal to rectify it. The Internal audit is conducted every financial year. The College appoints a qualified Chartered Accountant with the approval of the "Internal Audit Committee" for internal audit of the teaching and non-teaching faculty. The C.A. audits the finance related documents, balance, budget, income and expenditure, IT return, Form 16, etc. If any objections they are recorded and done away with.

External Audit

- The Accountants and General MP (AGMP) Gwalior carries out the audit of Hamidia College at a regular interval of 1 to 2 years and examines the entire income and expenditure in both government and non-government sources. The minor errors which are observed during the audit are removed and the audit report is handed over to the head of the institution. The major errors are reported in writing and the complaints is made as per the government rules.

In their subsequent audit the AGMP looks into the earlier audit objections and the complaints done. The pending audit objections are taken up. In this way the external audit is conducted for the entire income and expenditure of Hamidia College.

The department of Higher Education carries out the budget audit of institution; but however it has been done away with since 2011. In its place the treasury and Accounts, Madhya Pradesh carries out their annual audit of the budget and its expenditure. In case of any irregularities the correction are made within the time period and the responsibility of the concerned person is also fixed.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources**Response:**

As Hamidia is a Government college the college receives budget in salary head, contingency, scholarship and grant under RUSA and World Bank.

The budget is received in salary head from which salary is disbursed to all the teaching faculty and non-teaching staff throughout the year. Presently this is done online. Under contingency head, the budget is received for the entire year which is to be spent within the session. If need be for more grant, the demand is made separately for allotment.

The scholarship is disbursed directly into the account of concerned student on the bases of their caste and class. Likewise allotment is made for the accommodation of student (who couldn't be allotted room in the Hostel).

For the development of the institution, Rs. 400 is contributed by each student per year as "Janbhagidari Fee". This amount is incurred on furniture, purchase of necessary equipment, repairs and maintenance this is done according to the rules and regulation with due approval of "Janbhagidari Samiti".

The FA budget is received under four different heads within the main head. Amalgamated Fund Grants for all heads, sports, development of college, library. The budget received under these heads is utilized for the development of the institution. The amount is supposed to be spend in the same year. The remaining budget is deposited in the PD account by 30th June every year.

The amount in the PD Account is used for emergency expenditures and contingency provisions.

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

The IQAC consistently strives to institutionalize quality assurance strategy and processes every level of functioning of Hamidia College.

Effectiveness of Teacher Attributes

1. In order to improve teacher quality, the IQAC has been motivating the teachers to attend seminar and workshops.
2. IQAC encouraged the faculty to upgrade themselves technologically as per the UGC recommendations. They are motivated to use ICT and E-resources for teaching, learning and research.
3. Teachers' are encouraged to attend orientation, refresher and short term courses, faculty development programs in order to update themselves as per the requirements at national and global level.
4. Teachers are encouraged to give their inputs and suggestions for syllabus re-vamping as per the guidelines of New Education Policy (NEP).
5. IQAC contributes for initiating, enhancing and sustaining quality in the campus, it has taken positive steps in this direction. The college promotes the teachers; one member of the faculty is the Recognized Trainer at Government of India to deliver Direct Trainer Skill Course at National level. 04 members of the faculty have done this course. One member is the Master Trainer for COMMIT (Comprehensive Online Modified Modules for Induction Training) programme at Bhopal level and has conducted the COMMIT programme of Government of India to more than 400 trainees, More than 10 faculty members are resource persons.
6. A faculty member from the college took up Associate ship at the Indian Institute of Advanced Studies Shimla, (H.P.) continuously for three years.
7. The members of the teaching faculty are resource persons in various other academic institutions like RCVP Naronha Academy of Administration, Professional Examination Board, IGNOU, Bhoj University, Atal Bihari Hindi Vishwidyalya, Regional Institute of Education Bhopal, ELTAI, MANIT, Tribal department etc.
8. With the motivation and encouragement of IQAC many members of teaching faculty are adding to the quality in academics by being engaged in text book writing at Hindi Granth Academy.

Multidimensional Development of Students

IQAC has taken special efforts to inculcate students for their physical, moral, emotional, Psychological and spiritual development so that they are equipped to face the challenges in life. The teachers act as facilitators to guide the students to take up social responsibility, and enrich the society. They have given exposure to

students to latest technology by engaging lectures in smart class rooms. Their feedback is taken regularly for teaching-learning and other activities. Special efforts are taken to enrich the curriculum by activities like group discussion, quiz, literary and cultural activities. Student is encouraged to engage in community activities through NSS and social activity Club. They are introduced to the culture of the country by participating in the celebration of commemorative days. The students are sensitized for environment and gender issues. Their personality is developed holistically. The credit goes to the ambience of the college that not a single case of ragging or harassment has been reported in the campus.

The college also involves students with decision-making and support services in order to inculcate responsibility, purpose and a sense of duty to them for their holistic development.

Response:

Two Institutional Review and Implementation of Teaching Learning Reforms facilitated by IQAC are-

1. Enhancing Student Potential through Training

IQAC in Hamidia College follows a comprehensive method to enhance the student potential by various training programmes. In this direction, training for communication skills, soft skills, intra and interpersonal skills, ICT skills, entrepreneurship skills etc were organized.

- **Communication skills** of the students is enhanced by regular practice in the class room. Training on language and communication skills was conducted from 03-10-2019 for a duration of three months. 93 students enrolled in this programme and 50 students cleared the Lingua Skills Test organized by Cambridge University and Department of Higher Education. A work shop was also organized by the Department of English on the initiation of IQAC on 06-12-2017 in which 18 students participated.
- A workshop to facilitate inscript keyboard was organized by department of Hindi in which 62 students as well as faculty participated.
- IQAC initiated many programmes on personality development: A seminar was organized by Career and Guidance Cell on 16-08-2018 in which 30 students participated. A short term training programme was organized on 18-08-2018 and 26-08-2019 in which 70 and 92 students

participated.

- Trainings on interpersonal skills was conducted: Self defense training and awareness programme was organized on 20-09-2015 in which 40 students participated. In the last five years, four camps for yoga and meditation were organized in which 93 students and 97 professors and non-teaching staff participated for building self awareness, Emphathy Stress management, etc. A work shop on disaster management skills was organized on 17-04-2018 in which 57 students participated.
- IQAC took concrete steps to equip students with ICT skills to be at par at global level, as per the guidelines of UGC, NAAC and New Education Policy. Students attended 885 virtual classes and were comfortable with online teaching. The NRC center (Net Work Resource Center) provided exposure and opportunities to 696 students to be digitally friendly, enriched their critical thinking and exposed them to job opportunities.
- A joint training programme on financial literacy and Digital Banking was organized on 02-12-2016 in which 250 students participated. Workshop and sessions on Cyber Crime, Cyber Security and Ethical Hacking on 12-01-2019 and 12-03-2019 in which 68 students participated. The students analysed and discussed security issues in networks and computer system with the subject experts.

2. Academic Review

IQAC initiated the Academic Audit to take account of teaching learning process in all disciplines. IQAC constituted a three member committee to conduct the audit of the college for the session 2019-20. The committee was asked to take into account all academic matters of each and every department, and document it:

- The academic committee reviews the various documents-

 - Time Table and Planner
 - Syllabus and Allotment
 - Committees- Role and Responsibility, Plan of Action and Action Taken Report.
 - Documents of Internal Assessment, Field and Educational Trips

 - Minutes of the Monitoring Committee of Code of Conduct
 - Research Publications
 - Feedback System
- The Academic Audit assesses the fulfillment of the parameters of action plan, action taken reports, documentation of records of teaching practices, curricular and co-curricular activities, etc. IQAC takes regular meetings with head of the departments to monitor conduction of classes, delegation of responsibilities of all the committees, use of ICT and smart classrooms for teaching and learning, identification of slow and advanced learners and measures to cater to their diverse needs. Remedial Class are conducted for slow learners and advance learners are motivated for peer learning and go for extended learning.
- IQAC guides the faculty to engage students by experiential methods, use learner-centered method in the classrooms and evaluate the performance of the students in CCE, Practicals, Project and Final Examinations.
- In order to prepare the students for competitive examinations, *Utkrisht Jagrit Classes* are conducted: 1500 Books for competitive exams like MPPSC, Railways, Bank Exams, LIC, UPSC and examination conducted by professional examination board.

7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

Response:

The College secures gender sensitivity through various initiatives to maintain safe, secure and healthy atmosphere in the campus. Induction programme provides students information regarding gender equity, gender laws and gender sensitive issues.

The syllabi of various subjects also include gender specific content, especially in relation to role of women in freedom struggle, nation building, tribal society and literature; like History, (Role of Women in the national Indian Movement), Sociology (Social Processes and Change) English, Foundation Course (Moral Values and Language); thus, making students aware of the contribution made by the fair sex throughout the historical and cultural spectrum of the country. The content is devoted to revealing women's accomplishments in political, cultural, social, and economic domains, gender equality and rights of women.

30% quota is reserved for girl students in all the categories as per the rules and guidelines of the Higher Education Department. Special permission has been taken for admission of girls in the departments of Drawing & Painting and Sanskrit. International Day for Women is celebrated by creating awareness on gender equality, sensitivity, and justice. A painting exhibition focusing women was organized in 2019.

Information regarding special events on gender issues, delivery of lectures etc. is pasted on the notice board. The Women Anti-harassment and Empowerment Committee organized special talks on gender sensitization and cybercrime in association with M.P. Women Crime Cell.

Specific initiatives -

Safety and security

- Fully protected campus
- Anti-Ragging and Discipline Committee is always at vigil. Discipline committee acts as a deterrent agency against any mishaps and incidents.
- To safeguard interests of women in the campus, Women Grievance Redressal Committee is headed by a lady professor.
- CCTV cameras are operational, installed at all strategic locations.
- Women employees are engaged for cleaning of lady's washrooms.

Counseling

- Women-related issues are immediately resolved through counseling and discussions.
- Guest lectures are organized to create awareness about gender rights and legal provisions.
- A complaint box is provided for written complaints.
- Most of the faculty counsel students regarding career, goal setting, family-related issues, etc. Non-

teaching staff gives support in matters concerning admission, fee payment, scholarship issues, eligibility, examination, etc.

- A time slot for ladies is fixed for gym

- Two separate washrooms with adequate facilities for female staff members and girl students

Basically, being a boy's college, daycare center in the campus is not needed.

Women Anti-Harassment and Empowerment Committee

Govt Hamidia Arts & Commerce College is inspired by *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*. Quite a few initiatives are taken to appropriately dispose waste and sustain eco-friendly atmosphere in the campus.

Solid Waste Management

- Hamidia College implements solid waste management by enforcing proper segregation rules. Waste is collected in smaller bins, then transferred to larger bins. Dustbins are placed in all the Blocks (A,B,H,P,G), classrooms, corridors, office rooms, principal's chamber, departments and several other locations in the campus. Sweepers are engaged for regular cleaning of dustbins, sanitizing, and disposal of entire waste.
- Leaf litter from trees collected in heaps at a few places for decomposition. Organic manure thus produced is utilized for flower beds.
- Students are cautioned not to litter; encouraged to carry reusable cloth, jute or paper bags. Both the Environment Committee and Campus Maintenance Committee keep vigil on cleanliness, ensuring proper disposal of waste.
- The campus, including open areas, departments, classrooms, is cleaned everyday by sweepers.
- Solid wet waste from the canteen is disposed off in a proper way.
- Concrete steps are taken to reduce use of paper - both sides printing for assignment, notices, reports, submission etc. is practiced; official communication is through E mails, what's app, pdf files, PPTs, word files, Xcel etc.
- Old newspapers and stationery are sold to scrap dealers after tendering process. College produces lot of paper waste which is disposed off through vendors.
- Non-biodegradable materials such as plastic waste, polythene, metallic waste, glass, etc. are segregated; sold through the process of tender as per govt. procedure

Liquid Waste Management

- Minimal liquid waste that is generated either from washrooms or college canteen is drained through well-laid channels into civic drainage system or pits.
- Left over water from bottles and bucket etc. is used for watering plants.

Biomedical Waste Management

No biomedical waste is produced

E-Waste Management

- Minimal e waste generation is ensured by optimal and periodic maintenance of computers. The college has adopted a proper procedure for e-waste management to create an eco-friendly environment in the campus.
- Students are also made aware about responsible e-waste management.
- There are separate bins to dispose of e-waste like floppies, pen drives, USB cables, keypad, mouse, switches and regulators etc.
- Out-of-use computers and printers are taken on record and kept in e-waste storeroom for disposal through the process of tender.
- Likewise, miscellaneous e-waste such as batteries, bulbs and tube lights etc. are collected from departments, kept securely and disposed off safely.

Waste Recycling System

- The college tries to make full use of rainwater for irrigating flower beds, trees and lawns through well-laid water channels. There are no open drains in the campus, thus maintaining hygiene.
- Regular maintenance is conducted for the upkeep of water taps in washrooms.

Hazardous Chemicals and Radioactive Waste Management

- With only Arts and Commerce faculties in the campus, hazardous chemicals or radioactive materials are neither used nor generated.

7.1.8 Describe the Institutional efforts/initiatives in providing an inclusive environment i.e., tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socioeconomic and other diversities (within 500 words).

Response:

In Hamidia, the faculty members, non-teaching staff and students hail from various cultural backgrounds of MP and other states bringing a mini-India into the campus. The college believes in equal treatment to all irrespective of caste, creed, religion or cultural beliefs.

Measures for Equal Opportunities

- Hamidia college follows the reservation policies laid down by the govt. for admission of students. The committees ensure transparency during admission process, fee concession, financial assistance, and scholarships. Books are provided from library to students of SC/ST category.
- Institute has its own Code of Conduct and Book of Ethics. Student Grievance Cell and Women Anti-Harassment and Empowerment Cell, without prejudice, ensures tolerance and harmony, thereby empowering cultural and regional inclusion. Chapters on Constitution of India, National Movement, ethics and values in syllabi help students to imbibe and inculcate tolerance and harmony. Classes on communication skills cater to students of diverse backgrounds. Inclusive and supporting environment gives them scope to grow.
- Induction programmes help students to shun their initial hesitation.

Promotion of Diversity and Inclusivity

- Being located in old city area, students hail from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds. With competent faculty in five language departments, viz. Hindi, Urdu, Sanskrit, Arabic and English, the college offers an environment of mutual understanding and learning.
- Under '*Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat*' program and activities of its club, students learn about culture, traditions, and practices of institutions of the paired state Manipur creating inter-state bonding and promoting national integrity. Exposure to language, culture, festivals, social customs, and other aspects, taking oath in Manipuri language, brought about a sea change in students' perception about India as one nation.
- Joining the bandwagon of the state level Simultaneous Book Reading Programme, '*Padhe Bhopal*' on 09 October 2018, students and teachers participated in reading books from 8:30 to 9:15 am. This

generated interest and motivated younger generation for studies and reading books diverting their attention from social media.

- Faculty members, non-teaching staff and students from all backgrounds take part in festivities during National days celebrations and social and cultural events like World Hindi Day, National Youth Day, International Girl Child Day, International Women's Day, International Labour Day, World Health Day, World Environment Day, Earth Day, *Kaumi Ekta* Week, etc. Tenets of tolerance and harmony are also spread through youth fest, career fairs and exhibitions. Students pay reverence to their teachers on Teachers Day and New Year. Teaching and non-teaching staff celebrates *Vasantosava*, Diwali, Eid, *Makar Sankranti* etc. Career and Placement Cell organizes activities for entrepreneurial skill development. To cater to the linguistic diversity, cultural competitions are conducted in three languages, Urdu, Hindi, and English.
- NSS volunteers spread communal harmony, exhibiting greater responsibility, compassion, and helpfulness towards the needy through *Nukkad Nataks*, folk music, tree plantations, *swachhta* drive, blood donation camps, health checkups etc. involving all sections of people. Students pay respect to cultural, communal, socioeconomic, and linguistic values of villagers. The Cultural and Literary Committee organizes competitions to make students aware of our cultural diversity.

Hamidia College organizes activities that strengthen constitutional values, rights, duties and responsibilities of students.

The Constitution of India assigns high values and responsibilities on citizens viz. respect for the National Flag and the National Anthem, uphold and protect the sovereignty, unity and integrity of the country, render national service when called upon, promote harmony and the spirit of common brotherhood, renounce practices derogatory to the dignity of women, value and preserve the rich heritage and environment of the country, safeguard public property and promote education.

These objectives are in the focus of Hamidia College as the vision and the mission statements emphasize. The college promotes quality education with utilization of full human potential towards building equitable and responsible individuals of a strong nation. The college celebrates Constitution Day on 26th November every year with sensitization of students on accountability towards the constitutional values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens. Students are encouraged to participate in activities on the related themes. Every year Hamidia College celebrates Republic Day and Independence Day with hoisting of National flag, singing of National Anthem and devotional songs, taking of oath of national integrity. College invites

eminent persons to motivate students and staff by appraising the contribution of freedom fighters and accentuate duties and responsibilities of citizens. Celebration of National Voters Day and campaigns taken by the students make them aware towards their democratic rights and duties. Overall personality development of students is stressed in the college.

Academic and extra academic environment in the campus gives opportunity to the students to face challenges of the world while adhering to ethics and cultural values of our diverse nation. Students right from the time of their admission are encouraged to learn about duties and responsibilities of citizens. The college is a Research Centre for 10 disciplines. Postgraduate students are given lectures on research ethics.

At UG level, curriculum in Foundation Course deals with environmental issues to sensitize students for preserving ecosystem and environment. The students learn about moral values through Mahatama Gandhi's "My Experiments with Truth". They also learn about rights and duties, liberty and equality, justice, welfare state, power and authority, Indian National Movement, Fundamental Rights and Duties, etc.

Blood donation drives and road safety rallies infuse sense of pride, compassion, and responsibility towards the nation.

Volunteering in national health programme, in association with Government and Non-government organizations has created a niche for the students at the college. It is noteworthy that one student at the college, Shubham Chauhan, has been designated as Brand ambassador of *Swachchhata Abhiyan*.

Hamidia College celebrates National and International Commemorative days, Events and Festivals

National Days:

- Mahatma Gandhi's 150th birth anniversary gives us an opportunity to remember Gandhiji's messages on *Swachh Bharat*, rights of women & children, civil liberty of the disadvantaged, health, and well-being of citizens, etc. with special focus on farmers and villagers. Following activities were organized like cleanliness drive, helping elderly neighbors, donating clothes and blankets to the needy etc.
- Health and physical fitness. Students campaigned for healthy nutritious food, overall health and hygiene, Yoga, meditation, and nature conservation.
- Lectures organized on Gandhian Philosophy, teachings and ideals, communal harmony, truthfulness, and equality.
- Students participated in discussions on peace and non-violence and compassion for birds and animals. They promoted locally made goods under *Swadeshi* theme.
- *Shramdan*, i.e., dignity of labour was put into practice.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

A. Title of the Practice: Yoga and Meditation

1. Objective

- To improve physical fitness, mental ability, and emotional stability of the students.
- To help students grow in self-discipline and self-control
- To make students understand linkages between physical, mental, and emotional health and understand significance of spiritual values in human life.
- To improve the power of concentration, comprehension, and mental aptitude.
- To reduce stress and anxiety in the life of students and make them aware of its therapeutic advantages.

2. The Context

What were the contextual features or challenging issues that needed to be addressed in designing and implementing this practice (in about 150 words)?

In an environment of growing commercialization, professionalism, and individualism all around, students subconsciously join the race to achieve success, etc., without caring for a balance between life and profession, thus contracting anxiety and stress. Yoga and meditation, the traditional practices for a healthy life, are quite relevant both for teaching/non-teaching staff and students. The government, under its Vivekanand Career Counselling *Yojna*, has underlined the need of striking balance between work and personal life, which can be achieved through regular practice of Yoga and meditation that helps in facing competition or tackling challenging job situation may be because one's limitations of educational and economic background. Yoga and meditation, which are imbibed in Indian culture and now recognized globally, have proved their efficacy in making balanced personalities with composure and contentment.

3. The Practice

Describe the practice and its uniqueness in the context of India higher education. What were the constraints/limitations, if any, faced (in about 400 words)?

The College initiated practice of Yoga in the year 2015 when only a bunch of students, mostly sports persons, showed interest. Initially, Yoga sessions and meditation camps were only a few, like *Surya Namaskar* session on Swami Vivekanand Jayanti. Participation of faculty members was also limited. Later on, from the academic year 2016-17, as International Yoga Day became a reality, regular sessions on Yoga have become a regular activity with well-defined schedule, dedicated space and by involving established practitioners and gurus available in the city, prominent among them being Acharya Jitendra Singh.

Students' Yoga camps are organized in nearby rural areas for better concentration and focus. Yoga camp is organized separately for the faculty where they are encouraged and trained for practicing with their family members at home. It has been observed that certain exercises viz. *Surya Namaskar*, *Bhujanga Asan*, *Shalabh Asan*, *Trikon Asan*, *Yoga Nidra*, are elders' favourite who have made their family members also regular practitioners. Likewise, *Pranayam* exercises *Anulom-Vilom*, *Bhastrika*, *Ujjayee* and *Bhramari* are quite popular especially with the women faculty members. The non-teaching staff and Class IV employees have also shown great interest in Yoga. They attend sessions with full enthusiasm and experience benefits.

Students have benefitted by regular practice of Yoga and meditation, especially the *Pranayama* exercises. Excelling in sports like Kabaddi, Dragon Boat race, Karate, fencing, athletics, Judo, shooting etc., students have won laurels at national and international level for the institution. (List attached 5.3.1). A unique impact of this practice is that no case was reported in the Student Grievance Redressal Cell and there is no complaint regarding ragging. Marked improvement was observed in overall discipline in the college.

The practice is followed in NSS camps also where students involve villagers in the morning Yoga sessions. On 12th January, Vivekanand Jayanti, Yoga is practiced in the open space opposite *Swarn Jayanti* Hall, where all teaching and non-teaching staff and students participate together.

Constraints – In absence of a trained Yoga teacher, the Sports Officer fulfils this requirement as an additional responsibility. Lack of a practicing hall is another limitation, partly fulfilled with the conversion of the hall in A-Block into Yoga practicing area.

4. Evidence of Success

Provide evidence of success such as performance against targets and benchmarks, review/results. What do these results indicate? Describe in about 200words.

- The College organizes Yoga camps (07/03/2016, 29/01/2017, 07/02/2018, 15/02/2019) and workshops from time-to-time, where teachers and students actively participate. The impact of meditation is seen in nil case of students' grievance. The 10-day Yoga Camp proposed in the last week of March 2020 could not be organized due to COVID-19 pandemic.
- Yoga and Meditation have been our best practice for the last three years and its power and relevance were evident during the pandemic time. Students were able to keep a balance and a stress-free life not only for themselves and families but also for the society.
- Prizes won by our students in sports are indicators of success. Smart turn out of the college students bears lot of credit to Yoga practice; they have participated in State-level Republic Day Parade and represented the state at the national event in Delhi. Students of Drawing & Painting (05) and Urdu (02) were merit holders in the University merit list (2018), while one student of MA Hindi, Shivam Chauhan, became brand ambassador of *Swachhta Abhiyan* for Bhopal city. Needless to emphasize that Shivam is a regular practitioner of Yoga.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Please identify the problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice (in about 150 words).

- A make-shift hall to practice Yoga and meditation is not sufficient to accommodate large number of students. For simultaneous sessions in a healthy environment, the college requires a large, well-ventilated hall. Support material like Yoga mats, carpets, drinking water facility etc. need to be furnished.
- Apart from regular sessions in Yoga and Meditation, it is necessary to provide additional information and guidance through screening of videos and other material. A dedicated audio-video system (CDs, software) will support more effective and meaningful sessions.
- The college requires a trained expert-cum-trainer for uninterrupted sessions.
- This best practice has not been able to take shape of a regular course curriculum as the college does not have autonomy for design and development of curriculum.

B. Title of the Practice: Holistic Development

1. Objectives

- to inculcate among students moral, emotional, physical, psychological, and spiritual dimensions.
- to find identity, meaning and purpose in life by overall development.

2. The Context

In today's competitive world the students face many challenges both in personal and professional life. Apart from professional competence, there is need to equip students with intellectual capabilities, emotional abilities, and social skills, so they are physically, mentally, emotionally, and socially fit. Their logical and analytical thinking need to be sharpened. Students must also hone their intra-personal and inter-personal abilities in order to understand others and work in team, thus building strong relationships at

personal and professional levels.

3. The Practice

- Teaching methodology in this college is linked with real life situation emphasizing hands-on experiencing and learning. Classroom discussions, poster making, audio-visual aids, and other in-house forums enrich their knowledge and hone their skills for performance even in tough situation, like, restoration and relief works during natural calamity. Slow learners, having gap between their ability and performance, are identified and individual guidance is provided; they attend remedial classes and doubt solving sessions.
- Curriculum enrichment through group discussion, classroom teaching by students, quiz, presentations, debates, declamation contests, elocution contests, etc. helps students enhance their knowledge about subjects and application.
- Teachers frequently use ICT enabled tools and resources in classes. Students get familiar with technology-based learning methods. They attended virtual classes, lectures with power point presentations in smart classes, used virtual platforms like Google Meet and Microsoft Teams, attended ICT based programs, financial literacy and digital banking; cyber security; cyber-crime and ethical hacking; visited NRC Centre, etc.
- Students are encouraged to express themselves openly and identify their strengths and areas for improvement. Sessions and training on Personality development (26/08/2019; 27/08/2018; 16/08/2018; 30/08/2016); Language and Communication skills (20/02/2020, 04/02/2020; 03/10/2019; 26/03/2019; 04/09/2018; 06/12/2017, 14/10/2016, 25/07/2016), were conducted. Practice sessions on Yoga and *Surya Namaskar*, self-defense, life and work balance, disaster management, health and hygiene, moral values and education, character building, were conducted.
- Students were prepared for competitive examinations. *Uthishtha Jagrit Classes*, seminars and trainings were organized, subject experts addressed on intra- and inter-personal skills, interview skills, SWOC analysis, career options and opportunities, govt. schemes, Tally, GST, self-employment, organic farming, etc. Industry visits, MSME skill development program, career fair, campus drives were organized.
- Activities by NSS and Environment Committee are conducted round the session. On *Vishwa Baal Shram Nishedh Diwas*, students attended session on “Role of NSS volunteers in child protection against child labor.” Disaster management workshop (2018), summer internship in *Hinauti* village (2018) was organized.
- *Under Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat*, students visited Manipur State in student exchange programme.
- As part of holistic development, students participate in youth fest, cultural programmes, annual day celebration, awareness drives, etc. They are assigned various kinds of responsibilities to understand purpose of life and generate a sense of duty.
- The students get to interact with illustrious alumni of the institution, gaining from their knowledge and expertise.

Constraints – Non availability of a trained counsellor is a limiting factor and so is the constraint of time.

4. Evidence of Success

The practice has resulted in -

Academic and Personality Development

- Gold Medalist and five top position holders at university level were from Drawing & Painting dept, two from department of Urdu and Political science, while top three positions came in Department of Sanskrit (2019).
- Imparting better language and communication skills. 93 students took the training of Cambridge Assessment English Training Programme, from 03/10/2019 for three months and 50 students passed the Lingua Skill Test on 04/02/2020.
- Students took 90 hr. job-oriented training in association with NEF and NSDC.
- Six students cleared NET and one cleared CAT, after guidance by ex-Chairman UPSC.
- Induction programme (Deeksha 2020, 19/09/2019; 1/07/2015 to 10/07/2015) gave live lessons, students felt free to communicate with faculty, got information about academics, co-curricular, sports, NCC and NSS, student support services, anti-ragging law etc.
- Industry visits helped students to learn setup, functions, and role of industry in economic development. Learned financial management through workshop, lecture on GST by qualified CA.
- Personality development efforts helped in improving focus, creativity, critical thinking and empathy. 21 days short term training on Tally, organic farming, and personality development (August-September 2017); training on various aspects of behaviour and ethics (26th Aug to 24th sept, 2019) were organized.
- Students frequently engage in community works, which makes them sensitive towards society imbibing values and ethics as stated in the vision statement. The outcome of *Yuva Sanwad* program was awareness about HIV-AIDS. Students actively participated in *Manav Shrankhla*, awareness rally. On 'No Tobacco Day' students took oath to shun tobacco in campus. In Village 'Tarasevania', eye donation, body and organ donation drive, motivated villagers to fill *Sankalp Patra*. In *Yuva Sankalp Varsh*, State level symposium, Seven universities participated (2/12/2019).
- Care and respect for environment is on priority for the students. They created small water holes in college campus for birds and took care of stray animals and birds at various places in Bhopal city.

Indian Culture and National Integration

- Celebrated Gandhi Jayanti and National Integration Day, Teachers Day; 'Role of Indian culture and discipline in personality development'. Guru Poornima celebrated as *Guruve Namah* programme to pay reverence to spiritual and academic gurus (July 2018)
- Republic Day Parade – represented NCC Directorate at the annual RD Camp (2019-20). Two NSS students were selected for RD Parade at Ranchi, Jharkhand,
- Organized 'Sanskrit Week' (19/08/2019, 29/08/2018). Students learned about this ancient language, speakers highlighted the language as the oldest, purest, and grammatically most systematic. Urdu week celebrated with MP Urdu Academy; *Nazm, ghazal, taqreer, Baint Baazi* and *Tarana* were the main events. (9th to 15th Nov 2019)
- Learned about ethnic groups and tribes of India (Manav Sangrahalaya visit).
- University Youth Fest - Students won prizes in classical singing, Tabla (2019-20). Great Indian Film and Literary Fest (August 2017) helped in developing students' perception about performing arts.
- Wall painting and slogan competition on 15th August (2017); theme – Freedom. Helped develop an ability to organize visual elements.
- District level symposium: college student came First from among six participating colleges.

Human Values

- 46 students donated blood on 14/06/2017.
- Students collected Rs. 11,000 from staff and own contribution for Kerala Relief Fund. One professor went to Kerala and supported flood victims, helped in collection of Rs one lakh as relief measure.
- During Covid 19 lockdown, students arranged donation and distributed food grains to more than 100 families (May, June 2020).

Social Values

- NSS students collected cash, distributed food packets, masks, volunteered with district administration, inspired people for adopting COVID protocol.
- Motivated village children for higher education.

Sports

Participated and won awards in various international, national, state and university level events:

-5th International Euro-Asia International WFSKO Karate championship, (2019-20; 2018-19), Thailand Open 4th West Zone National Fencing Championship (international) (2019-20), 8th National Dragon Boat Race Championship (2019-20); Kabaddi, Athletics, Chess, Judo, Shooting, Softball, Boxing, etc.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources required -

- After school, the youth suddenly get exposed to life's challenges when they join college. They often get disoriented as several activities run simultaneously.
- Most of the students' hail from rural background; many commute long distances to attend classes; difficult to bring them on par with others.
- Communication skills in English are weak. Without a language lab, it takes significant effort to improve.
- Time is always scarce both with the faculty and the students.
- A full-time counsellor would go a long way in resolving personal and emotional issues.
- Need to correlate students' activity club with their performance giving due weightage.

Response:

Institutional Distinctiveness

Social Responsibility and Commitment: It is an established fact that students who are socially involved, make responsible citizens; such involvement inspires them to work for a greater cause, a greater good. Besides classroom discussions on social issues and doing projects on social causes, as part of their curriculum, the students take active participation in community and awareness programs, and volunteer for the community, especially when there is need for youth to extend help during natural calamity etc. The college believes in inculcating the gospel of 'Be the change that you want to see in the world'.

Responsibility is crucial in a democratic society. It expects people to get actively involved with community. In Govt. Hamidia College, Bhopal 'Social Responsibility and Commitment' is the keystone of education process, where self-responsibility and responsibility towards others, i.e., the society, go hand in hand. Our teachers are concerned about this aspect of life and educate their students to become responsible individuals in a supportive, committed, and inclusive organic culture. The genuine efforts of our teachers in this direction have produced encouraging results which are clearly reflected in the status of the college discipline, students' behavior, and harmonious relationship between students, teachers, non-teaching staff and authorities.

Areas where students excelled and exhibited their concern and commitment towards society are as under-

- **Students campaign to help flood victims.** The college students through NSS conducted a three-day campaign for financial assistance to the flood victims of Kerala in the month of August. (2019). The students collected the funds through donations from the public, the college faculty and sparing from their own pocket money. Some of them did away with their birthday celebrations and contributed directly to the campaign whatever little money they had. One senior professor from the department of Geography took great efforts to support Kerala victims. She personally went to Kerala and contributed for the relief of Kerala Social Victims in the village in Kerala; she even collected a cash amount of Rs. 1,00,000/-.
- **Students launch major social awareness drive in summer internship.** NSS students of the college carried out a major social awareness drive in the village named 'Hinauti Sadak' in July/August, with the following initiatives:
 - Tree plantation – shade bearing, fruit bearing trees and medicinal plants were planted in the village common land and a herbal garden raised in Panchayat Bhawan compound. Along with the village elders, ladies and youth, they took oath for conserving environment and protecting trees and conveyed appropriate message through slogans, like- "*sukhi dharti kare pukar, vriksh lagakar karo shringar*" and "*Ek vriksh sou putra saman*"
 - Personal hygiene lesson to school children – Correct way to wash hands was demonstrated to school children to make the children responsible both in school and at their homes. They were told about the health problems and diseases that spread when eating with dirty hands or not maintaining personal hygiene.
 - Cleanliness– Students carried door-to-door survey to see the status of personal and home hygiene in the village. Targeting Open Defecation Free (ODF) objective of the *Swachhata Abhiyan*, they guided villagers for making toilets in their homes and distributed toilet seats

to help initiate the process.

- **Digital India.** NSS students spread awareness about Digital India initiatives among the villagers of nearby village with one-to-one discussion, shared knowledge through slogans like –
 - “*Rashtriya Seva Yojna ka yeh Sandesh, digital ho ab apnadesh*”
 - “*Digital banking samay bachay, ghar baithe shopping karvay*”
 - “*line band karana hai, e-banking ko badhana hai*”
- **Disaster Management.** Govt. Hamidia College in collaboration with officials of the Bhopal Fire Control gave a mock drill in the college. The students learnt about the role of fire department personnel and the role that an individual can play in time of a disaster for helping in evacuation of the trapped people and fire and safety measures.
- NSS volunteers and several other students took part in free distribution of relief material like blankets to the poor and needy in nearby village ‘Hinauti’, which is adopted by the college.
- Students played *Nukkad Natak* in some villages of Bhopal district during COVID lockdown time. They played *Yamraj* to put across the need of social distancing and sanitization, non-adherence of which is fraught with serious dangers.
- **During the lockdown period** Due to COVID19, the volunteers of NSS and other students of the college carried out free food distribution and awareness programme under the guidance of the Principal and faculty. Six students donated blood and plasma at Bansal Hospital for patients in emergency condition. The students also participated in rangoli making, poster preparation, slogan writing, poetry recitation, etc. to spread messages on various awareness themes.
- **Literacy drive** was carried out in rural areas of Bhopal involving both children and adults. In the wake of increase in school dropout cases, the elders were persuaded and motivated for maintaining regular presence of their children in school.
- In collaboration with MLB College, the NSS unit organized food grains distribution in Deendayal Upadhyaya Colony, Ayodhya Nagar, amongst the homeless labourers, handcart pullers, destitute children, handicapped and the blind. The food packets included pulses, salt, cooking oil, sugar, spices, flour, etc. Faculty members also participated in this program.
- Created **awareness on social problems** like, juvenile crime, child trafficking, child labour, child marriage and child exploitation etc. Serious social problems were depicted graphically by the students. The teachers discussed Juvenile Justice Act with the students and made them aware of its provisions. The students realized how the negative effects of childhood labour impact their health, hindering both their physical and intellectual development. In the program, 'Youth as Champion for Child Protection' jointly organized with UNICEF, NSS, and AWAAZ, MP state-level competitions were organized, in which Bhagirath Prajapati won the second position winning Rs 3000 cash award in a slogan writing competition.

He has won more than 500 accolades in the last five years. The contribution of our students in community services, cleanliness campaign and nation building activities has been enormous. The awards won are National Youth Award (Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports Govt. of India), National Youth Parliament Festival, State Youth Parliament, Nation Building Activities (State Level), Award for Excellence in Community Services (Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports Govt. of India). Many faculty members are in Board of Studies in affiliated colleges other than Barkatullah University, Bhopal. One of the non-teaching staff, Dr. Rajesh Rangeele has been awarded Ph.D in the year 2020.

A new Block is under construction which will have a spacious library and well equipped classrooms which will go a long way in augmenting teaching-learning facilities.

Being the lead college and major research center the college is also a sanctioning authority for the following three fellowships - UGC Net/Junior Research Fellowship, Maulana Azad National Fellowship for Minority Students and Rajeev Gandhi National Fellowship for SC Students.

Concluding Remarks :

Government Hamidia Arts and Commerce College, Bhopal has been constantly endeavouring to provide a holistic education which nurtures creativity, competence, values and vibrancy. We are leaving no stones unturned in facilitating an environment conducive for the all-round growth of the students. The emphasis is on providing them an ecosystem where academics and various other learning activities work in impeccable harmony for their overall grooming. These activities not only augment the cognitive skills but also make them better equipped to face the challenges of a highly competitive global world. A number of scholarly activities such as seminars, workshops, lectures, trainings and discourses are organized regularly to promote and reinforce our quest for quality.
