15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Hamidia College envisions evolving into a comprehensive, multidisciplinary institution that addresses the diverse academic and personal growth needs of its students. The plan focuses on integrating various disciplines, encouraging interdisciplinary collaboration, and fostering a culture of innovation and creativity. The institution prioritizes providing a well-rounded education that transcends traditional academic boundaries, while nurturing critical thinking, creativity, and ethical values. The aim is to equip students to excel in an ever-evolving global environment by offering a balanced education that emphasizes academic excellence, social responsibility, and personal development. Adopting an interdisciplinary approach, the college offers a range of programs combining various fields of study, such as Psychology with Geography, Economics with Urdu or English Literature, and Geography with Sociology. These flexible combinations are designed to equip students with relevant skills and knowledge for today's interconnected world. In line with the National Education Policy (NEP), Hamidia College provides a multidisciplinary and flexible curriculum that allows students to design their academic paths and gain practical experience. The curriculum, as prescribed by the Barkatullah University (BU) syllabus, allows for flexibility, enabling students to enter and exit at different stages of their undergraduate education while ensuring academic rigor. Additionally, it offers opportunities for students to return to their studies later in their academic journey. The curriculum incorporates themes such as gender studies, human values, and environmental awareness, and emphasizes hands-on learning through project work in both UG and PG programs. To further enhance interdisciplinary research, the college has established a Research Committee and organizes lectures, workshops on Research Methodology and Intellectual Property Rights (IPR). Faculty members, who actively participate in the Board of Studies (BOS), contribute significantly to syllabus design and have authored textbooks that align with NEP principles. In line with its commitment to holistic development, the college organizes activities under three key themes: Dhara (environmental conservation and sustainability), Dharohar (literary and cultural heritage), and Srajan (innovation and entrepreneurship). These activities foster innovation, cultural appreciation, and environmental responsibility. Through these initiatives and the alignment with NEP objectives, Hamidia College aims to empower students to become well-rounded,

innovative individuals ready to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 introduces flexible entry and exit pathways for students, and the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) plays a crucial role in facilitating this flexibility. By streamlining credit access, the ABC enables students to retrieve credits earned earlier, simplifying their transition and enabling them to resume their studies seamlessly. Induction programs orient students to the NEP's key objectives, including the multiple entry and exit options available, as well as the flexibility in course combinations. Interactive sessions guide students through their academic choices, while expert lectures ensure that faculty members are aligned with NEP's learner-centered, outcome-based teaching methodologies. The college encourages faculty members to actively engage in curriculum development and adopt innovative teaching practices within the NEP framework. Additionally, students are encouraged to enhance their learning by enrolling in and completing online courses offered through platforms like Swayam, thus expanding their academic horizons and enriching their educational journey.

17.Skill development:

In line with UGC and NEP guidelines, Hamidia College emphasizes the enhancement of vocational education. The curriculum is designed to integrate hands-on learning through internships and projects, providing students with practical experience. The Personality Development Programme focuses on fostering the overall growth of students. To further support skill enhancement, the college organizes regular workshops on digital learning, soft skills, and communication. Activity clubs also contribute to the development of various skills. Industrial visits offer students valuable exposure to real-world work environments, while the Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Cell conducts specialized training sessions. In addition, skill development courses such as Tally and other vocational training programs are planned to equip students with essential competencies. The use of online tools aids in skill development, with faculty actively contributing to the creation of e-content that aligns with NEP objectives. The University also offers skill-oriented courses such as E-Accounting and Taxation with GST, Digital Marketing, and Environmental Studies. These courses aim to provide students with practical skills that are valuable in their daily lives and future careers.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Hamidia College integrates Indian Knowledge System into the curriculum in alignment with NEP. Offline and online courses teach in Indian languages and culture. Workshops, seminars on Indian art and culture, and Spoken Sanskrit and Spoken English classes are conducted. Drawing & Painting Department promotes Indian Art through exhibitions and workshops. Hamidia College plans to train faculties for classroom delivery in English and vernacular languages, aligning with NEP. The curriculum integrates the Indian Knowledge System, promoting traditional knowledge through UG programs in Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Urdu, and Arabic at the UG level. Cocurricular activities enrich cultural understanding, fostering a holistic educational experience - Hamidia College aligns with NEP to preserve and promote Indian languages, ancient knowledge, arts, culture, and traditions. The Cultural Club fosters awareness and pride in Indian culture through regular programs. The initiatives promote national integration and celebrate India's diversity. To preserve and promote Indian languages, Hamidia College can introduce other language courses. Workshops and seminars on ancient traditional knowledge, Indian arts, culture, and traditions are organized. Additionally, cultural events, exhibitions, and heritage tours are conducted to raise awareness and appreciation among students.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The goal of Hamidia College goes beyond simply helping students accumulate course credits. The institute is primarily focused on promoting higher-order learning and critical thinking among its students. Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is a student-centered approach that emphasizes what students truly learn, rather than what is merely taught. To implement the concept of "Learning by Doing," students are provided with opportunities for hands-on learning through projects, group assignments, practical exercises, and field visits. These activities encourage them to progress through higher levels, enhancing practical application and analytical skills. Additionally, Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE), carried out by subject teachers, is designed to assess the effectiveness of OBE and measure the achievement of course outcomes. This evaluation system helps in identifying and addressing any issues or gaps in the learning process in a timely manner. In alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP), Hamidia College has fully integrated Outcome-Based Education (OBE) across its mainstream programs. This system ensures that teaching methods and assessments are specifically designed to help students achieve clear and measurable learning outcomes. OBE emphasizes the development of practical skills and

competencies, with assessments focused on gauging students' success in meeting these outcomes. The goal is to enhance the quality of education by concentrating on well-defined learning objectives and preparing students for real-world challenges. At Hamidia College, a comprehensive strategy has been put in place to integrate OBE into the teaching approach, with careful attention to learning outcomes. Both continuous assessments and examinations are used to evaluate the achievement of course outcomes. In departmental and IQAC meetings, extensive discussions are held to refine pedagogical strategies, classroom activities, and assessment methods, ensuring they align with program and course objectives. The curriculum is crafted with clear Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs), which reflect the students' developmental needs. OBE principles are introduced to students during their induction and reinforced through departmental activities to facilitate effective learning.

20.Distance education/online education:

The college follows the curriculum framework set by Barkatullah University, which includes Core, Elective, and Vocational Courses. Several faculty members contribute to the creation of e-learning resources, such as e-content and digital tools. To enhance the teaching-learning experience, the college is equipped with modern amenities like Wi-Fi connectivity, projectors, smart classrooms, computer labs, and the latest software. Students are encouraged to engage in project work using PowerPoint presentations (PPTs). The college facilitated the use of Google platforms and government email IDs for faculty, improving the efficiency and quality of online education. In line with NEP and UGC guidelines, the college promotes blended learning to ensure continuity and inclusivity in education. This approach integrates in-person classroom sessions with online activities, making education more accessible and flexible, especially for students from diverse socio-economic backgrounds. The use of online platforms such as WhatsApp allows faculty to share e-content with students ahead of classes, encouraging peer learning, group discussions, and interactive sessions. Students are also encouraged to enroll in SWAYAM online courses to further their learning. The college plans to enhance its digital infrastructure. Online distribution of study materials and doubt-solving sessions ensure continued support and engagement for students. Tools like Microsoft Teams and Google Meet have been integral to the success of online teaching, learning, and evaluation. Faculty-developed e-study content is available on the college website and through the links.

As a government institution, Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce College adheres to the syllabus prescribed by Barkatullah University, incorporating essential themes such as gender, human values, and environmental issues. While there are limitations in altering the curriculum, these critical topics are well integrated into various academic programs.

Undergraduate students take course "Foundation Course - Moral Values and Language," which introduces them to Indian culture and fundamental human values. In their second year, they study "Environmental Studies," designed to foster an understanding of ecological issues and sustainable practices.

The Psychology curriculum includes a progressive exploration of

Topics in B.A. I include Humanistic Theory, Happiness, and Positive Thinking, while B.A. II focuses on Moral Development, Psychological Well-being, and Counseling Ethics. In B.A. III, students study Value, Personality, and Helping Behavior. At the postgraduate level, modules like Holistic Therapies, Yoga, and Meditation (M.A. II Semester) and Pro-Social Behavior and Social Facilitation (M.A. III Semester) deepen this focus.

Gender sensitivity is emphasized through chapters in English Literature, History, and Sociology, while the Green Club and Cultural Club promote environmental awareness, national integration, and cultural preservation. These initiatives ensure students receive a holistic education enriched with ethical, cultural, and environmental values.

The Library is the heart of any academic or research institution. Our library is partially automated and full automation process is in progress. The Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) powered by e-granthalaya, streamlines the management of library resource including books, journals, e-journals, e-books, e-shodh ganga and e-shodh sindhu. Alongside physical materials, e-granthalaya integrates digital databases and e-resources creating a hybrid repository of knowledge.

The library has shifted to a sprawling newly built block, which

includes a spacious reading hall, reference section, e-library, separate sections for newspapers/journals, library store, issue counter, library office, electric panel room and a separate baggage room for the students. A separate section of book-bank meant for the needy students is also available.

The library has internet/wi-fi connectivity and is under the surveillance of CCTV cameras. The library has 127976 books to support academic requirements of the students and faculty members. A separate competitive exam corner offers books and magazines related to various competitive exams. The SC/ST students can avail the facility of getting free text-books and reference books costing around Rs. 1500/- along with stationary items of Rs. 500/-

External Audit - The Accountants General MP (AGMP) Gwalior conducts the audit of our college at a regular interval of 1 to 2 years and examines the entire income and expenditure in both government and non-government sources. The minor errors are removed and the audit report is handed over to the head of the institution. The major

errors are reported in writing and the complaints are made as per the government rules. In their subsequent audit the AGMP takes up pending audit objections. Treasury and Accounts, Madhya Pradesh conducts their Annual audit of the budget and its expenditure.

As a government institution, Govt. Hamidia Arts and Commerce College adheres to the syllabus prescribed by Barkatullah University, incorporating essential themes such as gender, human values, and environmental issues. While there are limitations in altering the curriculum, these critical topics are well integrated into various academic programs.

Undergraduate students take course "Foundation Course - Moral Values and Language," which introduces them to Indian culture and fundamental human values. In their second year, they study "Environmental Studies," designed to foster an understanding of ecological issues and sustainable practices.

The Psychology curriculum includes a progressive exploration of ethical and humanistic values. Topics in B.A. I include Humanistic Theory, Happiness, and Positive Thinking, while B.A. II focuses on Moral Development, Psychological Well-being, and Counseling Ethics. In B.A. III, students study Value, Personality, and Helping Behavior. At the postgraduate level, modules like Holistic Therapies, Yoga, and Meditation (M.A. II Semester) and Pro-Social Behavior and Social Facilitation (M.A. III Semester) deepen this focus.

Gender sensitivity is emphasized through chapters in English Literature, History, and Sociology, while the Green Club and Cultural Club promote environmental awareness, national integration, and cultural preservation. These initiatives ensure students receive a holistic education enriched with ethical, cultural, and environmental values.

The Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) powered by e-granthalaya, streamlines the management of library resource including books, journals, e-journals, e-books, e-shodh ganga and e-shodh sindhu. Internal Audit- Our college has an Internal Audit Committee which ensures financial transparency. In issues regarding budget, income and expenditure. This committee keeps a tab on the fee received from students with DFC (Daily fee Collection), Bank statement and cash, book. Discrepancies if found are reported to the Principal and are rectified. The College appoints a qualified Chartered Accountant for internal audit of the College. The C.A. audits the finance related documents, balance, budget, income and expenditure, IT return, Form 16, etc.

External Audit - The Accountants General MP (AGMP) Gwalior conducts the audit of our college at a regular interval of 1 to 2 years and examines the entire income and expenditure in both government and non-government sources. The minor errors are removed and the audit report is handed over to the head of the institution. The major errors are reported in writing and the complaints are made as per the government rules. In their subsequent audit the AGMP takes up pending audit objections. Treasury and Accounts, Madhya Pradesh conducts their Annual audit of the budget and its expenditure.
